Restoring Houses and Souls

WHEN INDIANA LANDMARKS embarked on a housing initiative in Wabash last year, our intention was to acquire seven historic but badly dilapidated houses and return them to good condition and enhance the quality of life in the East Wabash Historic District. Along the way we learned of an opportunity for an unexpected partnership with an organization providing a critically needed service in the community.

Wabash-based Waypoint provides housing and rehabilitation services to women suffering addiction. Upon learning of Waypoint's need for a house in Wabash, Indiana Landmarks entered into a meaningful partnership, donating one of the newly acquired homes and working with Waypoint to raise funds to restore the large

Second Empire-style home (left) that will provide housing for 12 women. The project has gained widespread community support.

Among the biggest supporters is Wabash Mayor Scott Long who suggested the organization's name. "Waypoint

is a point between two locations. We chose Waypoint because you've got women coming out of a life of chaos and disorder, and this is a stopping point to get to a life of sobriety and family, and where they actually need to be in life," says Long.

Indiana Landmarks is honored to be part of this important effort that marries the respective goals of restoring houses and restoring souls.

Real Estate as a Tool for Transformation

INDIANA LANDMARKS' REAL estate program is about more than simply buying and selling properties. For us, it's a powerful tool for saving threatened or neglected places and sparking revitalization in areas that could use a boost. We employ a tried-and-true approach: investing in repairs to stabilize buildings and improve their marketability, then turning them over to buyers who finish the rehab. The projects become a billboard for the transformative power of preservation and a catalyst for additional investment.

In the last year, Indiana Landmarks sold properties in Vernon, Brick Chapel, Clarksville, Crothersville, and Wabash.

After living in a 1920s-era house in Indianapolis's Holy Cross neighborhood, Cru and Danielle Warren understood the needs of a historic

home when they began searching for a new place to live outside the city. The c.1884 Robert and Mary Ann Leavitt House in Vernon spoke to them when they spotted it for sale on Indiana Landmarks' website. Looking past the daunting list of repairs, they focused on the home's craftsmanship and intact interior features, including original trim, plaster, and unpainted woodwork. "We weren't ready to sell our home until we saw that house," says Cru. "We called the realtor immediately and put our house on the market."

By the time the Warrens moved in, Indiana Landmarks had already pulled off grungy aluminum siding and added a fresh exterior paint scheme. Along with other repairs, we replaced missing Queen Anne details, including roof cresting and a new porch. As a contractor, Cru felt equipped to take on the house's remaining rehab. The couple has been steadily incorporating vintage light fixtures and other old-house elements into the refurbished interior. "It's really hard to find a 130-year-old house in such an original state," notes Cru. "We have two little boys so being out in the country was really appealing as well."

Growing up in South Bend, another contractor, Charles Schmidtke, learned restoration skills from his father, Axel. Now the pair are putting their knowledge to work at the 1879 O'Hair

House and c.1875 barn in Putnam County. In 2019, after lightning sparked a fire destroying the house's roof and much of the second floor, the owner donated the property to Indiana Landmarks. We installed a new roof and made other repairs before putting the property on the market. "I had driven by that house 100 times and loved it," says Charles. "I like the Italianate style without all the gingerbread to paint. It's so sound and I'm very excited to bring it back to life." The father-son team plans to revive the property as a venue for small weddings and other events. He's already made connections with descendants of the original builders, who are planning a family reunion at the house.

As a third-generation antiques dealer and auctioneer, Joshua Baxter of Carmel has always mixed a love of history with a taste for treasure-hunting. "Some people have trouble seeing past the dirt and the work, but I feel like when I walk into a place, I can visualize the finished project before I lift the first hammer," says Baxter. That vision inspired him to purchase the c.1880 Wabash Sheriff's House and Jail from Indiana Landmarks in 2021. By the time Baxter purchased the property, Indiana Landmarks had already made exterior repairs and replaced a clunky front porch addition with one more stylistically appropriate. "This place was really done on the outside, so I could walk in and get inspired to do something on the inside," adds Baxter, who is using the project to teach rehab skills to his son, Josh Jr. The pair plan to convert the sheriff's house into offices and install three apartments in the former cell block, incorporating original details into the redesigned spaces.

In Crothersville, a dilapidated 1891 commercial building on a prominent downtown corner originally housed an apothecary and pharmacy, with an Odd Fellows Lodge above. Its demise seemed imminent before Indiana Landmarks took on the building in 2015, stabilizing it with money originally set aside by the Town for demolition. We fixed the roof, rebuilt windows and made other repairs before selling the building to Scott County residents John and Sarah Edrington. Attracted by the structure's "good bones" and its location along a heavily trafficked street, they plan to rehab the upstairs as apartments and lease the first floor for a restaurant.



A similar desire to revitalize a key downtown landmark—its last historic commercial building—led town officials in Dillsboro to recruit Indiana Landmarks to stabilize the c.1870 former Masonic Hall after a fire consumed the roof. Aided by \$25,000 from the Town, we installed a new roof and plan to make interior repairs before offering the property for sale.

In Clarksville, the town's historic preservation commission and town officials saw the historic South Clarksville neighborhood, located near the Ohio River Greenway and a new park, as ripe for reinvestment. In an area where many historic homes serve as rental properties, officials wanted to revitalize one house to inspire further investment. Indiana Landmarks acquired the c.1890 house at 619 Harrison Street from an out-of-state owner and sold the house to developer Andy Carter, who completed a top-to-bottom makeover recapturing the house's historic char-

acter. “Kudos to Indiana Landmarks and the Town of Clarksville for having a vision of what this neighborhood could be and encouraging others to see what can be done with old homes,” says Carter. In the past year, Indiana Landmarks also sold houses in New Carlisle and Jennings County, with sales pending at the end of the year on houses in Aurora and South Bend. Good Neighbors

IN ACQUIRING HISTORIC PROPERTIES, INDIANA Landmarks aims to lead by example. We invest our resources to stabilize buildings and add curb appeal in hopes of attracting preservation-minded buyers and inspiring others to improve their buildings, as well. In 2020, we seized the opportunity to make a big impact in one Wabash neighborhood, buying six historic houses in the East Wabash Historic District and accepting the donation of another house in the area. A year later, we've sold two of the houses and partnered to rehabilitate a third as a transitional home for women.

Wabash natives and Indiana Landmarks members Andy and Brittany Bain had been looking for an opportunity to move back home from Carmel when they saw an article about the project in an Indiana Landmarks e-newsletter. Captivated by a photo of the Classical Revival house at 143 E. Main Street, they saw their chance. In May 2021, they closed on the property and began restoring the house, previously carved into five apartments, back into a single-family residence. “It's about balancing the feeling of a historic home with modern conveniences,” says Andy. “My wife is a much bigger visionary than I am and was able to see what it could be.”

For years, leaders on Wabash County's Drug Steering Committee saw a need in the community for a place for women recovering from substance abuse. With six bed-

rooms and seven bathrooms, the Second Empire-style house Indiana Landmarks acquired at 189 N. Wabash Street offered ideal space. We're overseeing repairs at the property to adapt it for Waypoint, Inc., a new nonprofit formed to operate the facility. Once work is finished, we'll donate the property to the organization. “It's a really cool house that checks off a lot of boxes for us,” says Marilyn Custer-Mitchell, project chairperson. “Indiana Landmarks being willing to start the renovation and offer their expertise is a huge help to us.”

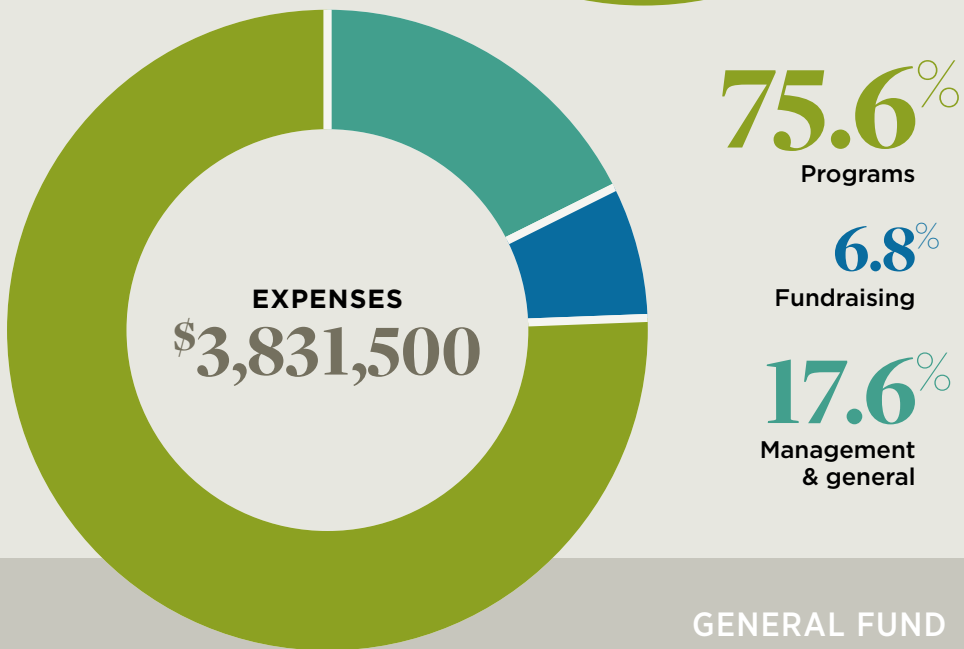
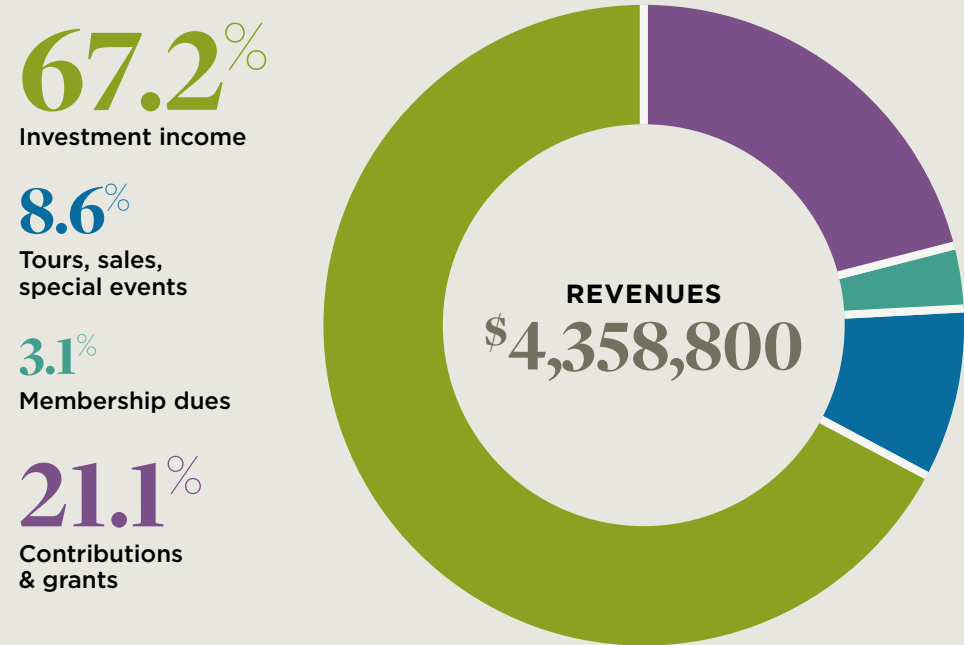

In the fiscal year ending August 31, 2021, Indiana Landmarks' finances continued to strengthen, with our net asset balance increasing from \$90.8 million to \$108.3 million, supported by positive returns on invested endowment assets.

Indiana Landmarks' staff and board-level finance and investment committees continue to carefully manage the organization's resources. We limited operational spending for the fiscal year to remain within our budgeted endowment draw, supplemented by additional revenues. The graph identifies the sources of operational revenue and our use of those funds.

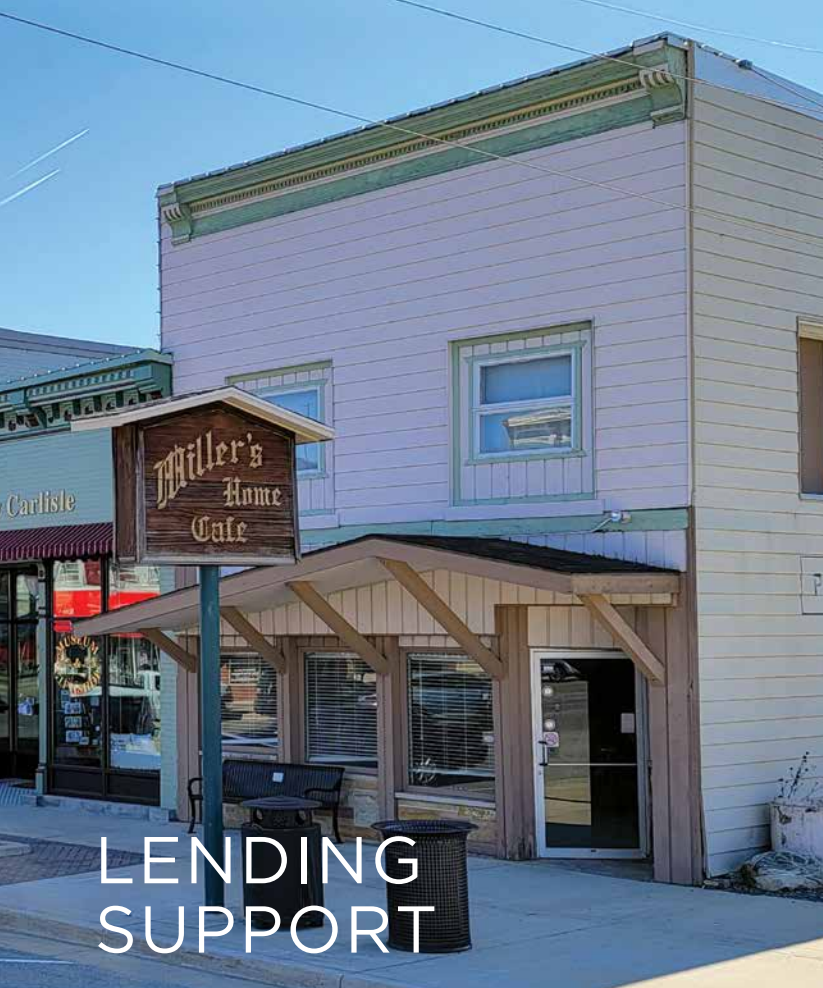

When banks say “no,” Indiana Landmarks’ Efrogmson Family Endangered Places loans help our local partners preserve buildings by offering critical financial support for the acquisition and rehabilitation of threatened landmarks. As part of the loan, recipients commit to attaching protective covenants to the deed, an important step in ensuring each property’s ongoing preservation.

In the fiscal year that ended August 31, 2021, loans from Indiana Landmarks helped two groups rehabilitate historic commercial buildings and boosted another’s efforts to put an endangered property on the path to a more certain future.

Indiana Landmarks’ affiliate Historic New Carlisle used a \$70,000 loan to purchase and rehabilitate the commercial building at 110 E. Michigan Street in the city’s National Register-listed downtown historic district before putting it back on the market.

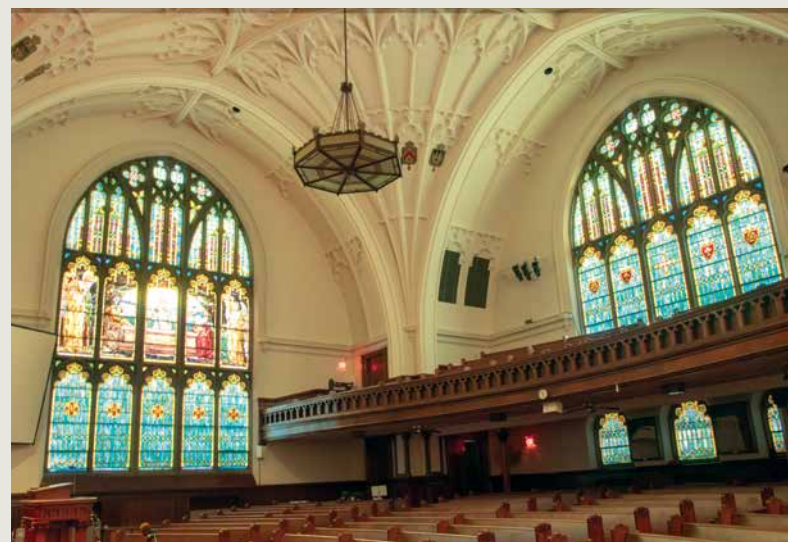
Our affiliate Huntington Alert plans to use a \$30,000 loan to repair the roof and exterior of a c.1890 commercial building at 20 N. Jefferson Street in the National Register-listed Huntington Courthouse Square District. When repairs are complete, the group will offer the building for sale to a buyer who can complete restoration.

Whitewater Valley Presbytery used a \$140,000 loan to settle ownership issues that put the 1906 Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church in Richmond in limbo and landed the building on

POWERFUL PARTNERSHIPS

When communities need advice on repairing historic structures or help saving threatened properties, Indiana Landmarks offers expertise, joining with local advocates to protect landmarks that matter to them.

In some communities, we formalize the relationship by staffing local preservation commissions through our commission assistance program, helping communities that don't have city staff who can fill the role. Local historic districts protect the visual character of landmark buildings, but they also play a vital economic role in neighborhoods and downtowns, boosting property values and encouraging investment. Historic preservation commissions oversee guidelines for such districts, regulating demolition and the design of alterations, additions, and new construction. Last year, we helped 17 local preservation commissions, advising on best practices and providing technical guidance.

Last year, Indiana Landmarks staffed local preservation commissions in 17 communities through our commission assistance program, guiding rehabilitation and redevelopment efforts in local historic districts. When the owner of Angola's 1923 First National Bank installed windows that diminished the building's historic character, Indiana Landmarks advised on more appropriate designs, installed in 2021.

In 2020, the owner of Angola's 1923 First National Bank installed new windows on the limestone building's second story without receiving approval from the city's historic preservation commission. The replacements compromised a character-defining feature of the building recognized in the National Register of Historic Places nomination for the downtown historic district. The City of Angola sued the building owner, and a resulting court order required the owner to put in more appropriate replacements or face hefty fines. Throughout the process, Indiana Landmarks staff advised commission members on design and spoke publicly about the importance of the building's features as part of Angola's historic streetscape. The owner installed new approved windows in 2021.

In other communities around the state, Indiana Landmarks stands alongside local preservation advocates and community leaders to lend our support—safeguarding properties from demolition, guiding redevelopment, and bringing attention to heritage.

In Bloomington, Indiana Landmarks helped the local preservation commission secure local landmark designation for the 1947 Kohr Building, the oldest structure at IU Bloomington Hospital's campus. When officials announced redevelopment plans for the site, we advocated for the designation to help protect the building from demolition as developers consider adapting the campus for mixed-use housing.

In 2021, we supported the local historic preservation commission's petition to rezone South Bend's Marquette Elementary School, a former entry on our 10 Most Endangered list. The city council approved the change in August, a move that would allow the property to be developed



as affordable housing. The South Bend Community School Corporation agreed to donate the school to Indiana Landmarks to facilitate the building's conversion to apartments.

In 2016, when we learned that Terre Haute's Miller-Parrott Baking Company building would soon become vacant, Indiana Landmarks reached out to developers with a track record of rehabilitating historic landmarks, arranging tours in hopes of sparking interest in adapting the 1915 factory for a new use. We also helped fund nomination of the building to the National Register of Historic Places, qualifying it for federal historic rehabilitation tax credits. Flaherty & Collins partnered with the Sisters of Providence on a \$11.7 million redevelopment to transform the building as Miller Parrott Lofts, an affordable housing complex for senior citizens that opened in early 2021.

Along with protecting existing historic places, Indiana Landmarks aids thoughtful redevelopment, providing feedback when proposals for new buildings would diminish the historic character of a district or neighborhood. In 2020, a proposal to tear down a three-story building for construction of a five-story apartment complex in the shadow of Indianapolis's 1927 Madam Walker Building sparked outcry among neighborhood residents, dismayed that its generic design failed to take into consideration community input or the neighborhood's heritage. Indiana Landmarks joined a collaboration of heritage preservation and development experts to lead community discussions on how design along Indiana Avenue could spur revitalization while honoring its history. The developer later withdrew its proposal, and we continue to work with local shareholders on a vision for the area's redevelopment.

Nearby, Indiana Landmarks spoke against the demolition of two historic homes in the Flanner House Homes Historic District, a historically African American neighborhood that includes 180 modest homes built between 1950 and 1959. Through an innovative self-help cooperative initiated by the city's Redevelopment Commission, African American

families, who struggled to secure conventional mortgages in the segregated city, helped build their own homes. More than half are still owned by the builders or their descendants. Supported by a grant from the Standiford H. Cox Fund of the Central Indiana Community Foundation, neighborhood leaders erected signage in September marking the area as a National Register-listed historic district. "We hope it will help raise awareness of the area's cultural importance for those visiting or considering purchasing property in the neighborhood," notes Mark Dollase, Indiana Landmarks' vice president of preservation services.

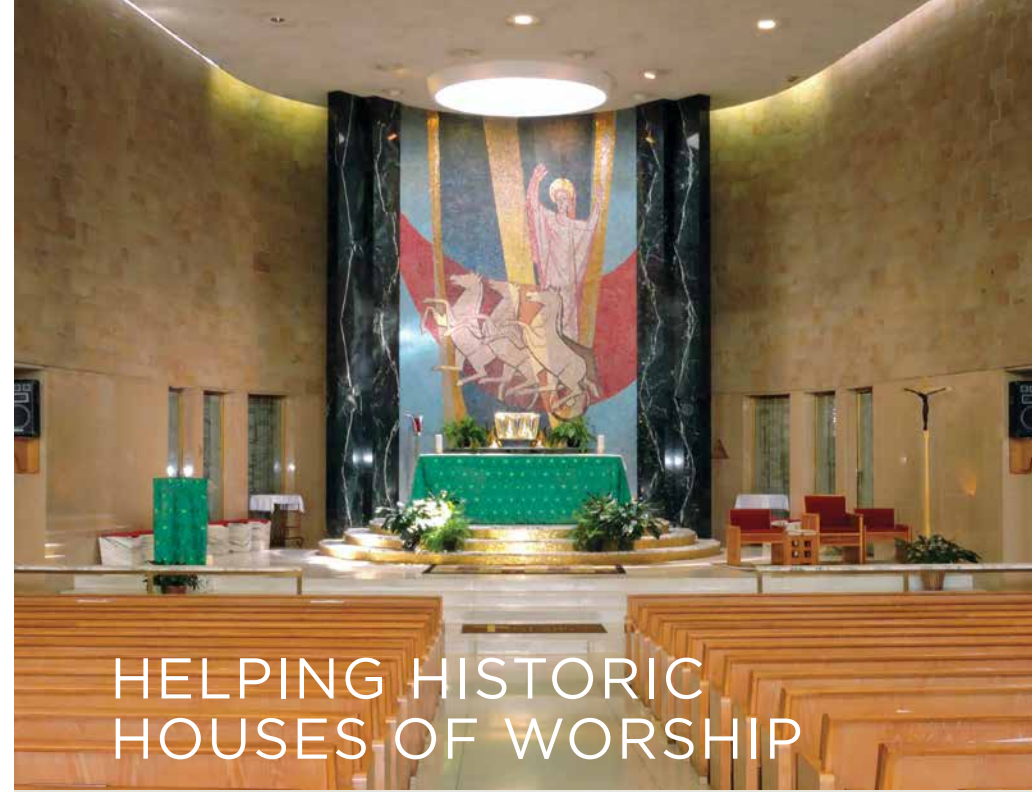

HELPING HISTORIC HOUSES OF WORSHIP

For congregations working to maintain historic houses of worship, Sacred Places Indiana is a valuable partner. Supported by funding from Lilly Endowment, the program is a collaboration of Indiana Landmarks and Philadelphia-based Partners for Sacred Places, offering guidance, training and grants focused on helping congregations leverage their historic houses of worship for outreach and growth.

Since its inception in 2015, Sacred Places Indiana has advised 35 participating congregations on landmark stewardship, fundraising, and community engagement. In the last year, the program awarded \$32,500 in grants to support planning and improvements at churches in Brazil and Indianapolis.

Sacred Places Indiana provides planning grants to help congregations prioritize repair needs at historic churches. Saint Rita Catholic Church in Indianapolis is using a \$7,500 grant to conduct a rehabilitation feasibility study at the Modernist house of worship.

In 2020, Lilly Endowment's Thriving Congregations Initiative awarded a three-year, \$1 million grant for a new program proposed by the Episcopal Dioceses of Indianapolis and Northern Indiana aimed at helping church leaders maximize use of their buildings as assets. Among other goals, the program will create an online inventory documenting underused and unused space in parishes, making it easier for community leaders to use the venues for potential programming.

Indiana Landmarks is partnering again with Partners for Sacred Places to support congregations involved in the initiative, offering our expertise to parishes with historic properties. "We believe that our collaboration will build healthy, thriving congregations throughout the state of Indiana that are able to fully activate their spaces and enliven their buildings in partnership with their communities," says Bishop Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows of the Diocese of Indianapolis. "Thanks to this grant, we can help lay and clergy leaders develop skills and resources to connect their buildings to their heart for mission and community-based ministry."

paying off for volunteers determined to save the historic railroad depot, turning the building from a “before” to “after” just a few years after demolition loomed. When complete, the landmark will be a tourism destination: a community events venue, local history museum, and a railroad transportation education center.

Built in 1908 as the Vandalia Railroad Depot, the building served passenger and freight traffic until 1958. In the '60s, new owners moved it to the edge of town and converted it into a coin-operated laundromat. Fire ravaged the structure in 2003 and demolition looked imminent in 2013, when the Flora Community Club rallied to save the landmark, dismantling the charred remains with plans to rebuild the depot near its original location downtown.

Since then, countless volunteer hours, donated materials, grants, and contributions have fueled a remarkable turnaround. Indiana Landmarks helped guide early reassembly and

restoration plans, providing an Efroymsen Family Endangered Places grant in 2013. The Tippecanoe Arts Federation provided a major financial boost via two North Central Health Services Capital Grants totaling more than \$219,332 for reconstruction and restoration.
